

It was also the leading producer of printed maps, including major colonial "firsts" such as the first printed map, first city map, first battle plan, and first map engraved on copper. This exhibition brings together, for the first time, a majority of these maps "made in Boston" in the century before the American Revolution. As a group they are remarkable for their idiosyncrasies of style and important contributions to geographical knowledge. 
